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Have a good read through the passage and then have a go at the questions...

1. This passage includes some real highs and lows. What are they, and why do you think it's important that Luke didn't just include the positives?
2. What strikes you most from each of the two halves of the story?
3. What lessons about God do we need to learn from this passage? How does remembering them stop us from an empty moralism that tries to be generous and truthful in our own strength?
4. What are the dangers of hoarding, and what are the dangers of giving? Which is more of a danger for you? What practically can you do as a result of this passage?
