Wrath or rest for rebels



REBELS

But these people have stubborn & rebellious hearts; they have turned aside & gone away (Jeremiah 5:23)

They, and we, fail to love God with all our heart and to love our neighbour as ourselves



WRATH

But I am full of the wrath of the Lord, and I cannot hold it in...... (Jeremiah 6:11a)
